


Hope to see all of you, old and new bass anglers and friends at Barkley Lake, Kentucky.




Rest assured, we still cling to NBAD's basic formula for good, decent, members fishing.

To the lucky NFSD fisherman who breaks and keeps the big lunker record in the NBAD team tournament.\* The current record is 7 lbs. 11 oz. held by John Cloy of Georgetown, LA, in 1976.



## NFSD Special Feat Award—\$500

To any lucky NFSD fisherman who catches a 10 lb. or heavier freshwater black bass in any local bass tournament. The lucky fisherman does not have to be a member of a local bass club, but the tournament must be affiliated with NBAD.\*

- \*To be eligible for these awards, both fishermen (team) in a boat must be NFSD members in good standing at the time of the feat. As in all other special feat awards, individual insurance coverage is \$5,000 permanent life coverage minimum or \$10,000 term life coverage minimum. Current NFSD members who have less than the minimum—and for health or age reasons are unable to secure additional coverage—are eligible for the special feat award. The local tournament chairperson will provide the NBAD Secretary-Treasurer with information about the special feat winner for publicity purposes.

#### NATIONAL BASS ASSOCIATION OF THE OFAF TOURNAMENT RULES

- 1. SPORTSMANSHIP: Any contestant who displays poor sporsmanship, violates any of the contest rules or violates the state fishing laws will be promptly disqualified. Especially should good sportsmanship and fair play be evident as regards non-contestant fisherman who might be fishing the lake during the event. Intoxication on the part of any contestant will not be tolerated and will result in disqualification. Any violation will result in a two (2) year suspension. If a 2nd offense occurs, a life time suspension will be imposed.
- 2. FISH: Black Bass ( Largemouth, Smallmouth, Kentucky and Spotted Bass ) may be scored only.
- 3. PARTICIPANTS AND ELIGIBILTY: Participation in the National Bass Association of the Oeaf Tournament is open to any hearing impaired or deaf angler; any hearing husband who has a deaf wife or vice versa; and no discrimination by sexes or races. Boat partners shall not be allowed to change unless by act of God. 18 YEARS & OLDER ONLY.
- 4. PARTNERS IN TEAM TOURNAMENT: Boat partners will be arranged by all contestants under mutual agreement. A team of two contestants (DOUBLE) will fish together throughost the entire tournament. No rotation of boat partners will take place for any given reason once their names are recorded in the book. In case of an emergency, illnes or serious injury, should any one member of the team be forced to leave the tournament, the other will either be automatically dropped out or be accompanied by an appointed observer (See rule #14). To preserve order and harmony in all NBAO Tournament where arrangement of boat partners is concerned, tournament officials reserve the right to make necessary charges or corrections. Boat partners shall have equal time in operation of the boat unless otherwise agreed. Selection of water routes and fishing spots shall be equally shared. Fair share in expenses involving operation and use of the boat is required of every boat partner.
- 5. TACKLE AND EQUIPMENT: Only artificial lures must be used. Only casting, spin casting or spinning rods and reels will be allowed. Only one line may be in the water at any time. Additional rigged rods will be permitted in the boat as substitutes. Use of 7½ foot flip rod is permitted. Motor trolling with gas-powered outboard engines is prohibited. Depth finders, thermometers, etc. which are not in violation of state laws may be used.
- 6. FISHING WATERS: All water in the lake where the tournament is held may be fished. No fishing will be permitted within 50 yards of another contestant's boat tied down or anchored and within 50 yards of the headquarters. Bank fishing is prohibited. Contestant may rent boats.
- 7. LAUNCHING TIME: Issuance of check in cards will be conducted at the boat dock area at a designated time. No time limit for check out and may check-out at your own discretion. Tournament officials must inspect your boat before you leave at first check-out. Must arrive with check-in card and fish for weigh-in before designated times; if late, will be diqualified for that one particular day. Contestants may return to dock lunch or rest but cannot report for weigh-in until at designated times for each day.

TUESDAY 5:00 A.M. TO 5:00 P.M. WEONESDAY 5:00 A.M. TO 5:00 P.M.

THURSOAY 5:00 A.M. TO 3:00 P.M. Due to some unexpected weather conditions, NBAD and Host officials may alternate the launch and weigh-in time.


- 8. SCORING: Scoring will be based on the weigh-in pounds and ounces of Black Bass. The minimum length is 12 inches (or more inches as enforced by controllers of certain lakes) with mouth closed. Only 10 bass (or the legal limit of that state where in the tournament is held) per person in the aggregate will be counted. No "COLO" or iced bass will be weighed. A technical testing method will determine if the catch was dead at least 24 hours. Bass brought in for weigh-in will have one of it's fins clipped off. Trophy fish for mounting will have it's tongue cut in the middle.
- 9. TIES: In case of a tie in total weigh of bass on the stringer, the flip of a coin will determine the winner, the loser will move to the next place. The winner of the largest bass caught on any one day will be determined (1st) by weight, (2nd) by length, (3rd) by girth.
- 10. LIFEJACKETS: Wearing of lifejackets on tournament waters is required when power-operated boats are in motion.
- 11. REGISTRATION: The date, time, and place or registration will be sent out well in advance to persons who are interested in entering the NBAD Tournament. All contestants must register at headquarters. Those who arrive late are still welcome; they must register before entering the tournament. Meeting time will be announced at the headquarters. Tournament fishing hours will be announced at the pre-tournament meeting.
- 12. RULE CHANGE: Interpretation of the NBAD Tournament Rules shall be the responsibility of the NBAD Vice-President with approval of the NBAD Executive Board. Final decisions in all matters shall be made by the NBAD Dfficers with approval of the NBAD Executive Board.
- 13. ODO NUMBER ENTRIES: If a participant is the last contest(odd number) and fishes alone, he/she will earn 1½ times his/her catch. The odd man in the tournament must be the Tournament Director or a NBAD Officer.

  (See rule 4) for boat partner.
- 14. SAFETY: To ensure the safety of all contestants, no contestants shall be allowed to compete alone in a boat at any NBAD Tournament. In case of a contestant who, after completing pairing of boat partners in the Tournament, finds him/her without a registered contestant as a boat partner shall immediately be assigned one of several appointed observers by the tournament officials. The observer, as boat partner, shall know the NBAD Tournament Rules, be permitted to operate the boat and assist the contestant in any way, EXCEPT FISH.
- 15. FISHING GUIDE: No fishing with a guide within 5 days prior the first day of the tournament. Upon evidence of fishing with a guide, the contestant will be disqualified for the entire tournament.

- 16. KILL SWITCH: To ensure the safety of all contestant, the hosts operated with electrical ignitions shall be required to have the kill switch in the entire tournament.
- 17. BOAT NUMBERS: Participating boats must have numbered stickers, issued by the NBAD officials at registering. They must be placed on each side of the outboard in a clear view. Numbers from 1 to 10 are reserved for the NBAD and HOST Committee officials to be in easy recognization. The rest of the numberals will go to the participating boats. It is important to keep your number on or face some difficulties on securing an other numbersl.

THE N.B.A.D. WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY ACCIDENTS DURING THE TOURNAMENT.

- d) Reminds NBAD officers and members of the following scheduled activities as stated in our NBAD Constitution:

- e) Sets up the NBAD directional signs at highway/road points to help NBAD members find the location of the tournament site; and
- f) Gathers and sets up all local bass clubs' emblems at the NBAD Headquarters.

#### WEIGH IN CHAIRPERSON:

- a) Makes sure that the following materials are available:
  - 1) ropes to keep observers at a distance
  - 2) bulletin board to be set up in weigh in area
  - 3) plastic bags -to carry and release bass alive and well
  - 4) clock to be used for check out/check in times
  - 5) check out / check in cards to pass to contestants
  - 6) offical weighing scale to weigh bass
  - 7) measuring board to check lenght of bass
  - 8) daily weigh-in sheet three (3) copies to be given per person: I for NBAD
    - 1 for Host Club 1 for Contestant

# **Equipment**

- Lingling your trailer lights before her king the boat down into the water. This will help eliminate blown lights.
- 2. A quarter-inch hole drilled into the plastic lens of your trailer lights will allow for rapid water drainage and save bulbs.
- **3.** If a loop forms on a spinning reel, remove the spool from the reel and pull off line from the bottom. You will get to the **stray loop** much more quickly than if you pull off line from the top
- 4. Wear several layers of clothing when winter fishing, rather than one heavy one. This allows you to shed or add, depending on the conditions
- **5.** Loading fresh line on a reel can be a mess of bedspring-like coils if you do it wrong. To keep from twisting it into hopeless kinks, the line mist go on the reel the same way it went on the manufacturer's spoot.

- **6.** Loading a spinning reel is accomplished by first putting the factory spool at your feet. Stand directly over the spool, tie the line to your reel and begin reeling in the line. Give the handle about a dozen cranks, then pause and give the line slack. Does it kink? If it coils unnaturally, the spool over to the other side and repeat the process.
- T. For bailcasting reels, tie on the line and put the spool flat on a smooth surface. This time, place your rod tip directly on the spool at the point line plays out. Begin taking in the line. It will lie-flat and straight on your reel.
- **8.** Select your line weight to meet the demands of the fish and the water conditions. If the water is clear and free of obstruction, use 8- to 12-pound monofilament. In heavy brush where the water is muddy or stained, beef up to 14- to 17-pound mono or ever higher.
- **9.** Be aware that heavy line can nullify the action of a small balt. For instance, the lighter the line, the deeper a diving plug will run. **Match your line weight** to the size of your lure.
- 10. Save valuable time on the water by working up a checklist beforehand: make sure all rods and reels are in order to the point of tying on

- 11. Repack the bearings of your trailer periodically Bearing Buddies, the kind that fit on the outside of the axle, allow for easy tubrication.
- 12. Polaroid sunglasses not only protect your eyes from the fatigue caused by squinting in the reflected sunlight, they also help the angler see below the surface of the water.
- 13. When huying a tow vehicle for your boat, order the stoutest suspension option available to accommodate the extra load. Installing a set of headers or a dual exhaust system in the vehicle will boost engine performance.
- 14. Wear your life jacket, zipped up. The prosido. They know that in the event of a mishap, particularly in cold water or at night, they will not be able to retrieve it easily if they go overboard.
- 15. Maximum fuel economy can be reached with the high-performance hull by quickly reaching a "planing" speed that will get much of the boat out of the water, riding on top of the waves instead of plowing through them



- 16. Carry a spare set of keys to your outboard motor and the locks to your trailer and tow vehicle in the event you lose your original set.
- 17. Check your fishing line continually for the line between your lips, which are more sensitive than your fingertips
- 18. If you don't have anything on your clothes or swimsuit to clip a "kill switch" to, loop it around your arm while running the boat.
- 19. Never put your engine selector in reverse unless the engine is running. Shifting into reverse with the ignition offican inflict severe damage on the shift pin, control box and cable. Even worse, it can break the shift shaft, which requires the removal of both the powerhead and lower unit for replacement.
- 20. Take the time and modest expense to protect the spare tire on your trader by purchasing a small lock.
- **21.** Doubling the oil portion of your oil gas mix will often double the life of your boat engine. It's important when you constantly run at or near top RPMs. Mix your gas'and oil properly. Put 3-4

gallons in the tank first, then add the oil, later filling the tank with gas.



- **22.** Keep in mind the opportunities offered by innertubes, kayaks, styrofoam floats and other one-man rigs. While they may look more like overgrown bathtub toys, they can help you get to big bass heavy cover.
- 23. Quick check for the new boat owner run your boat wide open and see if your tachometer is running within 200-300 RPMs of the recommended maximum RPMs listed in the engine owner's manual. If you are 500 RPMs off, take it to the shop to find out why.




# **Finding Fish**

- 24. In searching for bass, always try points of land leading into the water. The longer and sharper the point, the better. Points offer feeding spots at all depths, plus deep water nearby. Position the boat perpendicular to the point and over deep water: Cast into the shallows and work the bait all the way to the boat. This way you are covering all productive depths on the point with a minimum of casts.
  - 25. Sharp bends in a river or stream are good habitat for bass, especially on the outside hook where the current is swiftest. Here, erosion has disturbed the most rock and brush. Bass often favor the outside because it is deeper.
- 26. When you fish a flooded creek bed found on your depthfinder, position the boat in the channel so you can fan casts toward the bends on both sides.
- 27. Bass often hide in the safety of overhangs where they can protect themselves and still ambush baitfish passing by. Work your bait as close as possible to undercut banks and fallen trees.

- 28. Wading can be an effective means of reaching big bass. A careful stalk can put the angler within arm's length of the fish, without a neisy motor or sounds from a paddle. A wade lisherman also has the ability to work himself into excellent casting position that many boats can not reach. Be careful not to push a wake ahead of you that will warn the bass of your presence.
- 29. For wading on sand, gravel, clay or mud bottoms, use rubber waders with tread or cleat soles. If the bottom is slick bedrock or boulders, felt or rug soles grip better. Metal cleats in combination with felt are best with very slick rock footings.
- **30.** In power plant lakes, largemouths and other game fish will often lurk near the warm water outlet, especially in the winter when the rest of the lake is cold. Water in the area will be rich in oxygen and natural food stirred by the moving water. Best place to look for bass in these areas is in the eddies behind big rocks or at the edge of riffles.
- **31.** Beat the summer angling pressure and boating traffic on nearby lakes by fishing at night. It will be cooler, quieter and saner not to mention more productive.



- **32.** Even at times when they are feeding in the shallows or spawning, bass will seldom be far from deep water.
- **33.** The windy side of a point is usually more productive than the the protected side, because wave action stirs up food and attracts baitfish Also, the chop diminishes sunlight and visibility for the bass
- **34.** Most lakes near a large city draw heavy fishing and boating pressure on weekends. A majority of the fishermen will be fishing the banks. The angler who wants to save money by fishing close to home where pressure is the greatest must often move off the banks to catch his fish on weekends. Try flooded road beds, long points, underwater humps and drop-offs that show up on your depthfinder.
- drive a fish deeper into the cover, rather than farther away from it. This is where flippin' or dabbling or doodlesocking can be deadly
- **36.** For hest results in fishing lify pads, use pork find. Put a piece on a weedless hook or fit it on the end of a spinnerbail or add it to a spoon. Throw the lure into the little pockets and alleys in the pads.

- **37.** Any kind of **vegetation** growing in the water can be a holding area for bass. Duck weed, milfoil, hydrilla, coontail moss, etc. are all good fishing spots.
- 38. Best time to learn a reservoir for likely hot spots is during winter drawdown or summer dry spell when shallow-water points and bars are exposed. Serious anglers take pictures of these areas or plot them on a homemade map.
- 39. Gulls can be a signpost for game fish. They feed on baitfish driven to the surface by game fish below Schooling largemouths, white bass and stripers all force shad and minnows to the top where hungry birds wait for an easy meal.
- 40. Points thrusting into lakes are perfect for shore anglers because they can be fished just as efficiently from the bank as from a boat. Select the points with gravel or small rock rubble rather than the ones with larger rocks and boulders. It will be easier to get around on the small stones, plus you will hang up less often.
- 41. Some of the best bass fishermen in the world are also the most meticulous. They keep detailed logs on every trip. How many fish did I catch? At what times of day? What kind of water was I fishing? What was I using for bait? What was the water temperature? These reports over a

period of years can give you an instant starting point the next time you go out.

- 42. One productive area for bass is often where a tree has fallen into the water at right angles with the shore. This offers protection for the fish and allows the angler to draw his lure parallel to the cover, where it will be exposed to the most bass-holding water.
  - 43. In aging reservoirs where most of the natural cover has rotted, you can build vour own artificial reef by submerging a bunch of Christmas trees, tree cuttings or old tires. These areas, which you will have pinpointed, will quickly serve as holding areas for baitfish and game fish alike. Check with local authorities first.
  - 44. In cool weather, bass school vertically or stack up in a small spot. In warmer water, they spread out horizontally, covering a larger area. Consequently in winter, you have to search harder to find a concentration of bass, but when you do, fishing can be much more productive.
  - 45. When fishing in a group, devise a methodical game plan. Have one boat-load of anglers fish one kind of water with a certain kind of bait. Assign another boat to fish different depths with different lures. Arrange a meeting place to compare notes.



# Lures

- **46.** Single-blade spinnerbaits, which are designed for fishing deeper water, will hook more fish if you clip an inch or so off the blade wire arm and refasten the blade spinner to the shortened wire.
- 47. Fishing clear water without success? Try scaling down the size lures, using lighter line and a whippier rod.
- 48. The old adage "big bait, big fish" often holds true for the use of plastic worms. Don't expect many strikes on a 9-inch worm. But when you do get one, expect it to be a keeper. Best big bass baits are large worms, jigs and frogs, topwater Zara Spooks and buzz baits.
- 49. If your crank bait is running to one side, turn the bait's eye in the direction you want it to run. If it runs wildly to the left, for example, twist the eye to the right.

- **50.** Vinyl skirts are considered better skirts for spinnerbaits when they are used for night fishing or whenever the bait is fished with a slow jigging yo-vo motion. When the lure is fished faster, or in the winter when the water is colder, rubber skirts have the edge.
- 51 Rule of thumb: bright day, use white; dark day, use black.
- **52.** If you're already using a trailer hook on a spinnerhait, and bass are still striking short, try trimming back the skirt. If that doesn't work, turn the trailer hook upside down so it points in the opposite direction from the spinnerbait hook.
- **53.** In fly-fishing, use a wide, open-gaped hook with a very sharp point. The barb is bent low or removed. This assures the best chance of hooking any bass that grabs the fly.
- **54.** Generally, the larger the front lip on a diving plug, the deeper it will work. To make crank baits run deeper: (a) switch to lighter line; (b) make longer casts past the target; (c) hold the rod tip under water.
- 55. Use the lightest sinker that will still pull your worm down into the "pay zone." Small sinkers allow your plastic worm to work more naturally, plus it will hang up on the bottom less.


- **56.** Most veterans hook their live minnows through the lips to allow them free movement. Hook crawfish through the fail. Both are excellent natural baits for bass.
- **57.** Know your topwater plugs and how they work. The chugger has a concave face and pops when retrieved. A slasher has a propeller, sometimes front and back, and creates a spluttering noise. The stickbart looks like a cigar and dances on retrieve.
- 58. A poll of several leading manufacturers revealed that chartreuse is America's favorite spinnerbait skirt color, with yellow, black and white close behind.
- **59.** At night, look for fish in shallower water than during the day. Use plastic worms, spinnerbaits and topwaters Most popular colors in all three lure types is black.
- 60. After you catch several fish from a single spot and they guit biting, switch colors of lures and you may get a few more responses.
- **61.** With topwater baits, size and action are far more important than color. As a rule, however, use dark lures at night or during dark nights and bright lures on bright days.

- **62.** When bass are feeding near the surface in flooded cover, use a steady retrieve plug rather than a pause-and-jerk popping lure, which is more likely to hang up in the brush.
- **63.** To make pork frogs and other ture dressings more soft and supple, add a drop or two of glycerin to each bottle. That shortens the life of the pork to about a year or so. Add more flavor to pork dressings by adding a couple of drops of anise oil to the bottles.
- **64.** On **short outings**, say half a day, limit your fure choices to a few old dependables. You will catch more bass concentrating your efforts on a few baits other than scattershooting with a wide range of lures and wasting time tying knots, etc.
- **65.** Beginning flyfishermen should select their bass bugs with care. Shop for hugs with moderate amounts of feathers, hair or rubber tails. The hook eye should be free of paint. Avoid tender, soft bug head materials. Cork and plastic are more resilient than balsa and expanded plastics.
- **66.** If you recover a jighead that was himg up on a snag, check carefully to make sure the hook

is returned to its original shape. Otherwise, out of tune, it will continue snagging even more obstacles.

- 67. There is a growing number of anglers who think bass have something of a sense of smell. Avoid putting oil, gas and other chemicals in contact with your lures.
- 68. Look at the first bass you hook. Is the lure barely hanging out of its mouth? If so, maybe your lure is a bit too large or maybe the fish just missed on his attack. If you have a slightly smaller lure of the same style and color, tie it on. If the bass is firmly hooked, you may be right on track.
- 69. Bass fishermen are learning what trout fishermen have always known: feed the fish the size food they are feeding on. Watch for feeding activity. If the bass appear to be dining on tiny minnows, throw small baits. If they are chasing big shad, go up accordingly. Match the hatch.



### **Techniques**

- **70.** Handle bass all game fish with care. The human hand can disrupt the natural slime coating that protects the fish from fungus and disease. When boating a bass you intend to release, thumb him or use a net. Handle it gingerly in the head area, take your pictures, then quickly return it to the water.
- Have a small hook hone handy in your tackle box. Remember: sharp hook, sharp fisherman.
- **72.** For close-order Flippin' work, most anglers prefer their clothing to be subdued in color. Except in the case of long dabbles or flips, when the angler must stand, it is usually best to keep a low profile on the water.
- 73. A good knot to learn is the Palomar. Pass the end of the doubled line through the eye of the hook. Grasp the loop and bring it up and under the doubled line, forming a loose overhand knot.

Holding the overhand knot with thumb and forelinger of one hand, take the loop with the other hand and pull it over the book, then put it short end to lighten the whole thing. Stup the excess and you're ready

- 74. Know your local game laws. Many states are now experimenting with new minimum size limits on bass as part of a progressive fisheries management program and will not hesitate to cite violators.
- **75.** When fishing a grub, if the hait hands up on an obstacle, don't try to pull it loose. Tighten up on the rod and grah, the line with your forefinger. Pull the line tight with your finger, as if drawing an archer's how, then let it pop. A couple of tries should free the bait.
- 76. When tying knots in monoblament, always moisten the knot before tightening it, either in water or with saliva. This permits the line to slip more smoothly without abrasion.
- 77 You don't want that trophy-sized bass on the end of your line to jump. In the air, he could either spit out the hook or when it falls back in the water, it could land on the line and break it with his sheer weight. To keep it in the water, point your rod tip downward even into the water while still keeping a tight line on it

**TECHNIQUES / 25** 

- 78. For landing a big fish without a net, fight the bass until it tires, then bring it to arm's length and scoop it up by the turning. This "belly lift" method momentarily paralyzes the fish and allows you to subdue it.
  - 79. Most night anglers say unexpected flashes of light in a boat spook bass. However, a growing number of fishermen are going against that long-held tradition and fitting their boats with floodlights. This makes for easier boat handling, knot tying, etc. and does not seem to hamper fishing.
  - **80.** Save gas and precious fishing time by launching your boat closer to the area of the lake you intend to fish. Check out a lake map before your trip, particularly to unfamiliar waters.
  - 1. 81. On bright days, always work your bart through or near the shady side of an obstacle, where bass seek protection from the sun.
    - **82.** In springtime, when fish are scattered, set the trolling motor on high speed and move through the shallow water area quickly, making short, accurate casts to every target. The angler who makes the most casts into the most productive spots will catch the most fish.

- 83. If you have a hunch that a bass is furking in a particular spot but several casts with a plastic worm don't draw a strike, make a final cast to the spot, let the worm sink to the bottom and permit it to lie there motionless for 30 seconds to a minute. Then, move it a few inches. This "deadsticking" method often draws strikes from tazy bass.
- 84. If newcomers make a mistake common to all, it is fishing too last. Work a spot thoroughly. Give a likely place a chance to produce
- **85.** When fishing from the shore, walk gently, particularly in the spring when bass will be up in the shallows spawning. Boggy or hard ground will transmit the vibration of your footsteps and spook the fish. Sneaking the shoreline is especially important when fishing farm ponds and other small waters.
- 86. Best baits for working moss beds are plastic worms, topwaters and spinnerbaits. Try to keep these fures as close to the vegetation as possible without actually going into it, disturbing the bass and getting hung up.
- **87.** Get the net ready before you hook that big bass, handle printing toward you near at hand. Fumbling for the net during the battle creates have that could lead to lost lunkers.

"The Texas Rig"


- 88. Most popular plastic worm style is the "Texas rig." Penetrate the head of the worm with the point of the hook and push it into the bedy of the worm then out the side. Pull the worm up the hook so that it covers the eye and knot. Firm the hook over and re-insert the point rote the worm. This rig will be virtually weedless.
- 89. Attaching a rubber-core sinker ahead of the lure will help most any balt run deeper
- **90.** Elippin' accuracy will improve with practice. Set up targets 20-22 feet away and work on swinging the bait at the objective. Standing on a low stool about 18 eiches off the ground will simulate your height above the water when you go Elippin' for real.
- 91. To keep a jig from twisting your line to on a barret swivel to the end of your line then attach your line with about a 6-inch leader. This eliminates kink yet allows the but to move freely.
- **92.** When fishing shallow water with any kind of bail, try to avoid throwing the lure directly on top of the exact spot where you think the bass might be hiding. Nothing spooks a lish quicker than having a strange object bombed on its head.

TECHNIQUES / 29

- . **93.** In worm fishing, try to eliminate any bow in your line. The straighter the line, the better the communication between the fish and you.
- 94. Fish parallel to the rocky rip-rap of a dam. This allows you to cover more water in a shorter period of time. Work your boat back and forth in front of the rip-rap, from shallow to deep. Best fish are often caught in 10-12 feet of water.
- 95. On schooling bass use a heavy spoon or tailspinner. Often the larger fish are working at the bottom of the school, dining on scraps that drift down from the active, smaller fish,
- 96. When casting in heavy standing timber, remember that what you see is not nearly what you get. You see only the very top of a tree. Far below, however, the fish may be clustered around the trunk. If a log is lying at an angle in the water, work your bait where the blowdown rests on the bottom.
- **97.** Want to mount that fish of a lifetime? Keep it refrigerated until you reach the taxidermist and take care to prevent mars and wounds on its skin. Storing it in a towel or newspaper is better than a plastic sack.

- 98. Discovering the best topwater retrieve of any given day is trial and error. Sometimes the key is to let the plug remain idle for a few seconds before easing it into action. Other days, the bass will hit a lure that immediately leaps into action. Sometimes bass go for a plug pulled with hard, water-sloshing jerks. Striped bass like the third retrieve best.
- 99. An old-fashioned bandana can be as useful for the angler as it was to the cowpunching ranch worker. Tie the bandana around your neck and it protects the area just above the collar from sunburn. Or moisten it and wear it rolled around your forehead as a cooling sweatband. In winter, wear it in front to keep the wind off your throat. Squirt it with bug dope to keep the insects away. Hang it in your pocket to serve as a ready-wipe for your hands.
- 100. The fresher the fish, the better it tastes Refrigerate your catch, then eat it as soon as possible. If you freeze the fish, store them in milk cartons filled with water to preserve flavor and prevent freezer burn.
- 101. Catch more schooling fish by attaching a trailing jig or grub to a topwater plug. Fish will be attracted to the commotion on the surface and hit the trailer, plus the extra weight allows for long casts that will help keep your boat from spooking the fish.
