## Another broken record NBAD Team Tournament at Watts Bar Lake

National Bass Association of the Deaf is definitely growing with new and regular "Die-Hard" fishing people. Why people? Because we have diversity of cultural and general NBAD fans, participants, supporters and sponsors that have been making NBAD successful.

The record breaker of the last NBAD tournament recorded two hundred twelve (12) NBAD participants. Tennessee Bass Association of the Deaf and HI-BASS was the host to the NBAD. The co-hosts did a fantastic job promoting the NBAD. Special hats off to the co-hosts!

**Impossible Be Possible"**

This incident happened during the 1998 National Bass Association of the Deaf (NBAD) Annual Team Tournament at

Watts Bar Lake in Tennessee.

Miles South, North, East and West from NBAD Headquarters on the beautiful and spreading Watts Bar Lake early Tuesday morning 106 teams, composed of two fishermen a team zoomed in their high powered bass boats to their "honey holes," with a hope that the large lunkers were there waiting to grab some morsel offered by the fishermen.

Tuesday the first day of the tournament in the afternoon, nearing time for the teams to return to headquarters, the wind started blowing harder, causing the waters out in the wide openings to be very rough, causing foaming wakes. Most of the fishing was done in coves and small canals to escape from the rough water and wind.

Mack Wilson, NBAD Secretary and his partner Medford Magill had to return to the headquarters a little early because of other official duties they had to do at the weight-in time. When we skimmed into rough open water, the lake was rough up as if it is somewhere in the Gulf of Mexico. With its high speed bassboat skimming and flopping over the top of the waves, keeping their caps on was impossible so they took them off and sit on them.

After a rough ride, worst than a wild bronco ride, we arrived at the headquarters safe minus Medford's cap. Upon nearing the dock, Medford with Mack's help, could not find his cap anywhere in and around the boat. Then Medford told Mack that he assumed it flew out more than one of the big flop waves



somewhere miles out in the lake and to forget the cap. Of course, Medford was disappointed to lose the cap that he had the ninety-eight hosts, Missouri and Tennessee embroider on it. He said that he had more than 100 caps anyway. That Tuesday, we brought in only three eligibilities weigh in bass with Mack 2 and Medford 1.

Wednesday morning of the tournament, the same 106 boats zoomed out all over the lake. We decided to try another "honey hole" destination farther South that day.

After fishing several coves and canals with little luck, we assumed that we ran into places where the bass were still in the kindergarten class. (Not eligible to keep, less than required 12" in length). So, on another move through a passage that was a short cut into another part of the lake, Mack elbowed me at the controls and pointed to a cap floating on a small bush pile, Hey! Mack, pointing to the cap, said, this is your cap, Medford! I laughed because I knew that was impossible! My cap was one of the 200 plus caps that the host had given out.

I was aware of the possibility of getting the host caps mixed up with anglers, so I scribed my name on the back of the manufacturer's label in the cap.

Still laughing, I managed to get my boat close enough to the spot

where the cap was floating for Mack to grab it. The cap Mack grabbed was sure one of the hosts' caps. I told Mack, if this cap has my name on it, then it is mine. Mack picked the cap from the lake and peeled off the label slowly and said "M A G I L L."

Unbelievable, I yelled back at Mack and said stop kidding! Mack then handed me the cap and I read my name on the cap saying "M A G I L L". This got my eyes wide open Sure enough, it was one of my caps floating on the lake so huge you will never know where it was when it flew off your boat.

Thank Goodness. This cap will be another one of my collections since the beginning of the NBAD back in 1975. Super natural occurrence and an unbelievable thing happened so we should learn from it and accept the fact that nothing is impossible.

### Southern California Deaf Anglers Club (SCDAC)

John DuQuin, California

John DuQuin captures Western  
Deaf Bass Championship for the  
3rd Time at Lake Berryessa!

It was a heavy pouring hitting at  
Lake Berryessa Thursday, April  
23, 1998 and filled the lake to its  
full capacity. It was beautiful  
day both Friday and Sunday.  
Nevertheless, Saturday was very  
windy and caused the water very  
choppy. Just a month ago, heavy  
rainstorms flooded 2-3 feet deep  
in some campground areas that  
were very muddy forcing  
vacationing deaf anglers and their  
families finding somewhere else  
to stay overnight. The storm also  
hit just a few days before  
Northern California Angling and  
Camping Club of the Deaf held  
its 13th Annual Western Deaf  
Bass Championship event on  
April 25-26 weekend. It was the  
only annual deaf bass fishing  
tournament in Western states.  
Lake Berryessa is in Napa  
County, Northern California that  
is renowned for its famous wine  
manufacturing.

Bass fishing sizzled with many  
new club records and some good

numbers of deaf anglers reported that they boated 15-40 fish per day including several largemouth bass weighing up to almost 10 lbs. The hottest lures were plastics and jigs. This deaf bass tournament set twelve new records for the most fish catch/weight! The impressive record of most fish catch in two days was whopping 140 bass (previous record was 101 from last year).

The biggest bass of the tournament was 7.15 lbs. It also sets a record! We were catching more largemouth bass than smallmouth bass this year.

A 3-time bass champion in 1989, 1993 and 1998, John DuQuin of Rancho Cucamonga, CA was the first deaf bass pro to receive top honors at the Western Deaf Bass Derby at Lake Berryessa 3 times! He decked ten bass totaling 15.9 lbs. including his 4.5 and 3.6 lbs. bass to lead him into winning this championship! His secret was using 6 inch smoke or clear plastic worms and green lizards in 5-10 depth of the lake near some brush and rocky ledges.

John DuQuin received a pleasant trophy plaque with an attractive handmade sculpture of jumping bass plus \$450.00.

The 2nd place winner went to Robert Odom of Oakland, CA with \$300.00.

Last year's champion Dave Ford of San Ramon, CA finished 3rd with \$250.00.

Milton Peters of Fremont, CA

won 4th place with \$200.00  
Keith Brown of Downey, CA hit 5th place for \$150.00.  
Edward Smith of Bera, CA for 7th place at \$90.00

The lunker Saturday was by John DuQuin at 4.5 lbs. with \$75.00. The Sunday Lunker prize went to Richard Tennies for \$50.00 and the biggest lunker of the tournament. He set a new record of 7.15 lbs.

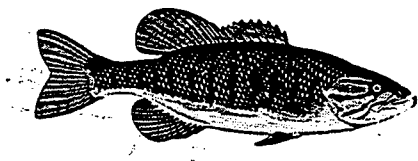

Lake Ouachita has beautiful water and it's about 48,000 acres of crystal clear water.

For information at Lake Ouachita's Regulation, Black Bases (largemouth and spotten combined), daily limit is 6. Any largemouth bass caught from 13 inches to 16 inches long must be returned to the water. Largemouth bass must be at least 12 inches to 12 15/16 inches long to keep. Spotted (Kentucky) bass must be at least 12 inches long to keep. All smallmouth bass on Lake Ouachita must be immediately released, unharmed to the water.

## ARTICLE VII - TOURNAMENT RULES (continued)

- Section 10 - SCORING:** Scoring will be based on the weigh-in pounds and ounces or pounds with two placed decimals. The minimum length shall be 12 inches with mouth closed or the legal minimum length of the NBAD Tournament Lake. The maximum number of bass shall be 10 bass per person per day or the legal limit of the NBAD Tournament Lake. [The new five basses per person will go in effect during the year of 2000.] NBAD will deduct two ounces (2 oz) for each dead bass brought in for weight-in by each participant.
- Section 11 - TIES:** In the even of a tie where the weigh, length, and girth of a fish are equal, all prizes shall be divided equally and additional trophies, if necessary, shall be awarded.
- Section 12 - LIFE JACKETS:** Contestant must wear life jackets while gasoline powered boats are in use.
- Section 13 - REGISTRATION:** The date, time, and place of registration will be sent out well in advance to persons who are interested in entering the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. All contestants must register at headquarters. Those who arrive late are still welcome they must register before entering the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. Meeting time shall be announced at the headquarters. Tournament hours shall be announced at the General Meeting.
- Section 14 - RULES CHANGES:** Interpretation of the NBAD Tournament Rules shall be the responsibility of the NBAD Vice President with approval of the NBAD Executive Board. The NBAD Officers shall make final decision in all matter with the approval of the Executive Board.
- Section 15 - MONDAY LUNKER TOURNAMENT:** There shall be two participants per boat with no exception and each participant must be registered to fish in the NBAD Tournament. See rule Section 6 for special handicapped.
- Section 16 - SINGLE ENTREE NUMBER ENTRIES:** If a participant is the last contest a single entree and fishes alone, he or she will earn 1 1/2 times his or her catches. The single fisherman in the NBAD Tournament must be the General Chairman or NBAD officers (see rule Section 5 for boat partner).
- Section 17 - SAFETY:** To ensure the safety of all contestants, no contestant shall be allowed to compete alone in a boat at any Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament or NBAD Tournament. In case of a contestant who, after pairing all of the boat partner in the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament, finds him or her without a registered contestant as a boat partner shall immediately be assigned one of several appointed observers by the tournament officials. The observer, as boat partner, shall know the NBAD Tournament Rules, be permitted to operate the boats and assist the contestant in any way (see rule #14).
- Section 18 - FISHING GUIDE:** There shall be no fishing with a guide for hire within fourteen (14) days prior the first day of the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. Upon evidence of fishing with a guide, the contestant will be disqualified for the entire NBAD Tournament.
- Section 19 - NO FISHING PRACTICE:** There shall be no fishing during the General Meeting.
- Section 20 - KILL SWITCH:** To ensures the safety of all contestants, the boat operating with electrical ignition shall be required to have a kill switch in the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament and it must be engaged while boat is moving.
- Section 21 - BOAT NUMBERS:** Participating boats must have numbered stickers, issued by the NBAD officials at the registering. Numbered stickers must be placed on each side of the outboard in a clean view. Numbers from 1 to 10 are reserved for the NBAD officers and host committee officials to be recognized. It is important to keep your number on or face some difficulties on securing another numeral.
- Section 22 - REASON FOR LEAVING:** That before the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament a replacing fisherman must pay his/her full tournament fee before the NBAD Tournament.
- Section 23 - C. B. Radio:** Participant in the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament shall not use a C. B. radio and shall disqualify and be rejected from that tournament.
- Section 24 - DISQUALIFIED:** A contestant who is disqualified for any of the three days can weight his fish in case his reason of disqualification(s) is appealed.
- Section 25 - BOAT REQUIREMENT:** Every boat in the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament must have the following items: kill switch, safety cushions, life jackets, first aid, fire extinguisher, state fishing license, and horn and/or whistle.

## ARTICLE VII - TOURNAMENT RULES

The Tournament Rules shall apply to both the one day Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the three days NBAD Tournament. The Monday Lunger Tournament is a single fish tournament and only the largest bass shall be awarded as decided beforehand by the COR. NBAD Tournament is a team tournament where each team will be awarded as decided beforehand by the COR. The Tournament Rules shall be printed with the tournament-announced rivers and inside each souvenir book every year.

**Section 1 - SPORTSMANSHIP:** Any contestant who displays poor sportsmanship, violates any of the contest rules or violates the state fishing laws shall be promptly disqualified. Intoxication on the part of any contestant will not be tolerated and will result in disqualification. Any violation will result in a two (2) year suspension. If a second offense, a lifetime suspension shall be imposed.

**Section 2 - CLUB SHIRT:** Every member who participates the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament is encouraged to wear club's name on his shirt.

**Section 3 - FISH:** Black bass (largemouth, smallmouth, and spotted bass) may be scored only.

**Section 4 - PARTICIPANTS AND ELIGIBILITY:** Participant in the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament is open to any deaf or hard of hearing and no discrimination by sex or race. Changing of boat partner shall not be allowed unless by act of God. Participant shall be 18 years of age or older.

**Section 5 - PARTNER IN TEAM TOURNAMENT:** The Host Club and NBAD are not responsible for the pairing the partners. All contestants will arrange boat partners under mutual agreement. A team of two contestants will fish together throughout the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament or the NBAD Tournament. See special handicapped rule Section 6. No rotation of boat partners will take place for any given reason once their names are registered with NBAD. In case of emergency, illness or serious injury should any one members of the team be forced to leave the NBAD Tournament, the other will either be automatically dropped out or be accompanied by an appointed observer (see Rule # 15 or replacing fisherman rule #21), to preserve order and harmony in all NBAD Tournament where arrangement of boat partner is concerned. Tournament officials reserve the right to make necessary changes unless otherwise agreed. Each two-man team shall equally share selection of water routes and fishing spots. Fair shares in expenses involving and use of the boat is required of every boat partner. Non boaters (partner) shall not be liable for expense incurred by the breakdowns on the equipment including a boat, itself during the NBAD Tournament. The boat owner should prepare and be responsibility on his or her boat. Boat owners/partners shall not, during weight-in, use another members' boat stalls. Boat owner/partner shall be disqualified.

**Section 6 - SPECIAL HANDICAPPED PARTICIPATION:** Two teams can fish out of a platoon boat. Each team must have one healthy person and one handicapped person. Rule # Section 5 shall apply as if it is one team and both teams must be mutual when sharing the responsible of a platoon. There shall be one Host committee observer for each two-team boat.

**Section 7 - TACKLE AND EQUIPMENT:** Artificial lures shall be used during the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. Only casting, spincasting, or spinning rods and reels will be allowed. Only one line may be in the water at any time. Additional rigged rods will be permitted in the boat as substitutes. Use of 7 1/2 foot flip rod is permitted. Motor trolling with gas-powered outboard engines is prohibited. Depthfinder, thermometers, etc., which are not in violation of state laws may be used.

**Section 8 - FISHING WATERS:** All water in the lake where the Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament and the NBAD Tournament are held may be fished. No fishing will be permitted within 50 yards of another contestant whose boat tied down or anchored, and within 50 yards of the headquarters. Bank fishing is prohibited. Contestant(s) may rent boats.

**Section 9 - LAUNCHING TIME:** Issuance of check-in cards will be conducted at the boat dock area at a designated time. No time limit or checkout and may check out at your discretion. Tournament officials must inspect your boat before you leave at first checkout. Tournament participants must arrive with check-in card and fish for the weight-in before designated time, if late, will be disqualified for that one particular day. Contestant may return to dock for lunch or rest but can not report for weight-in until at a designated for each day. Dues to unexpected weather condition, NBAD Executive Members may alternate the launch and weight-in time. Monday NBAD Lunger Tournament shall be on a Monday before Father day and the time shall be from 6:00 A.M. until 11:00 A.M. The NBAD Tournament shall be on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, before Father Day in June. The time of the NBAD Tournament shall begin at 6:00 A.M. and conclude at 3:00 P.M. each day unless state regulations are different from NBAD.

## 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Invitational Tournament - Lake Anna, VA hosted by MarVa Silent Bass Anglers

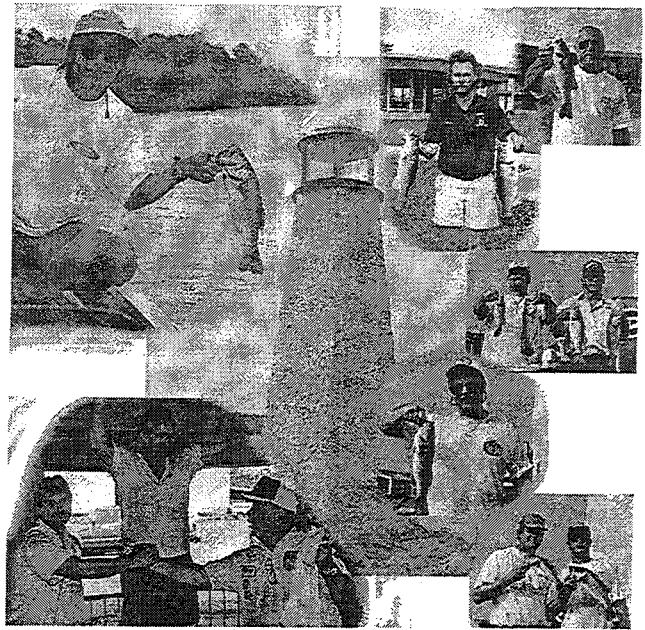

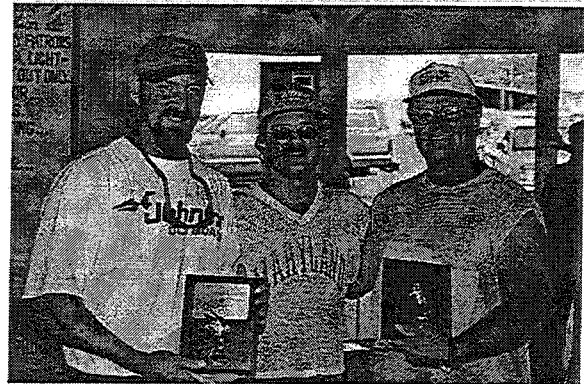

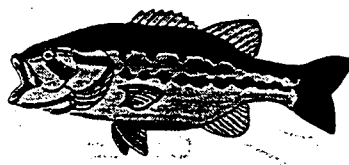

# THE ULTIMATE BASS FISHING GUIDE

Anglers across the country fervently pursue largemouth bass, America's favorite gamefish, in farm ponds, lakes, impoundments and rivers. This adaptable creature has fittingly been called "the mouth that swims." When the mood moves them, largemouths attack all manner of artificial lures, from purple plastic worms to crankbaits, spinnerbaits,

topwater plugs and everything in between. In this handy guide, you'll find expert advice on fishing for largemouth bass in America. You'll learn about "reading" bass water, where, when and how to fish essential lures, and rigging terminal tackle. Pull the guide out of the magazine and keep it in your tackle box for instant reference. You'll be glad you did!

## Reading Bass Water

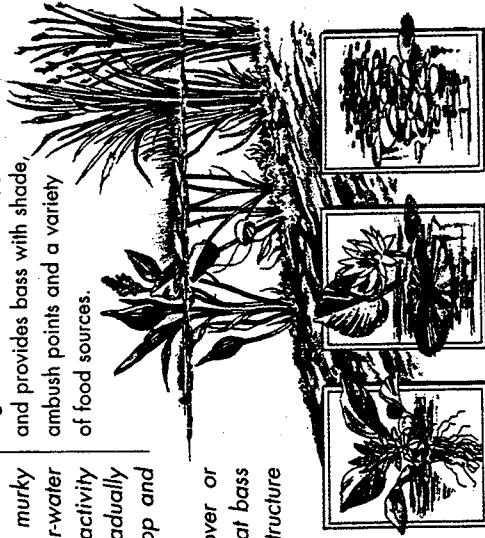
To get within casting range of largemouths, you must read the water and determine productive fishing locations. From a seasonal perspective, largemouths stay deep in winter and move shallow in the spring to feed and spawn. Summertime bass tend to remain shallow in murky waters and move deep in clear-water environments. Shallow feeding activity increases in the fall and then gradually declines as water temperatures drop and bass retreat to the depths.

Bass habitually relate to cover or structure. Cover refers to objects that bass move into, under or close to. Structure indicates bottom formations bass favor. Hot spots often exist where you find structure embellished by cover.

### PRIMARY COVER:

#### WEEDS

Make weeds your top priority in waters that grow this type of bass cover. Aquatic vegetation filters and oxygenates the water and provides bass with shade, ambush points and a variety of food sources.



Emergent plants, such as cattails, bulrushes and reeds, grow from shallow bottoms and extend above the surface. They harbor bass mainly in spring and early summer and again in the fall.

Some floating weeds, such as lily pads, root in the bottom, while others, including duckweeds and hyacinths, float free and are blown about by the wind. Shallow bass regularly lurk beneath these dense canopies.

Submergent vegetation, the best of the bass weeds, roots in the bottom to depths of 12 feet or more. Common varieties include



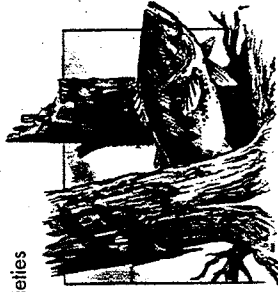
milfoil, hydrilla, coontail and pondweed. Submergent plants yield superb bass fishing spring through fall. They die down through the winter and grow back from seeds or short stems.

The weeds lie below the surface early in the year, but they hold bass long before you see them. Some varieties

pop-out on the surface in late summer and fall, forming dense mats.

#### WOOD

Anything wooden pulls bass like filings to a magnet. Worthy targets include windfalls, flooded bushes, willows, standing timber, stumps, snags and logjams. Wood produces throughout the season and at any depth bass frequent.



### ROCK

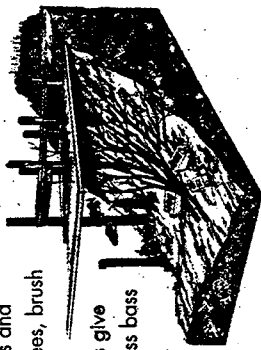
Often found on steep banks and short points near deep water, rocky

bottoms generally give up more bass during cool-water seasons. Look for chunk rock mixed with clay or mud and also gravel bottoms.



### MANMADE

Cover created by human hands has enormous bass appeal. Riprap, bridge pilings, boat docks and planted trees, brush piles and stake beds give up countless bass each year.



### STRUCTURE

Contour lake maps and depthfinders let you "see" beneath the surface to find structures (bottom changes) that attract bass. Places where the bottom abruptly plummets, called drop-offs, appeal to bass everywhere.

In impoundments, the edges of inundated creek and river channels form prominent drop-offs. Bass congregate in channel bends, especially outside bends. A channel bend that swings close to the shoreline often forms a steep bottom that features rocky, stair-stepped ledges, an excellent spot in cold water.

Underwater points, which typically extend from points above the waterline, comprise another key bass structure. Long, sloping points produce best in hot weather. Submerged humps and islands also accommodate bass.

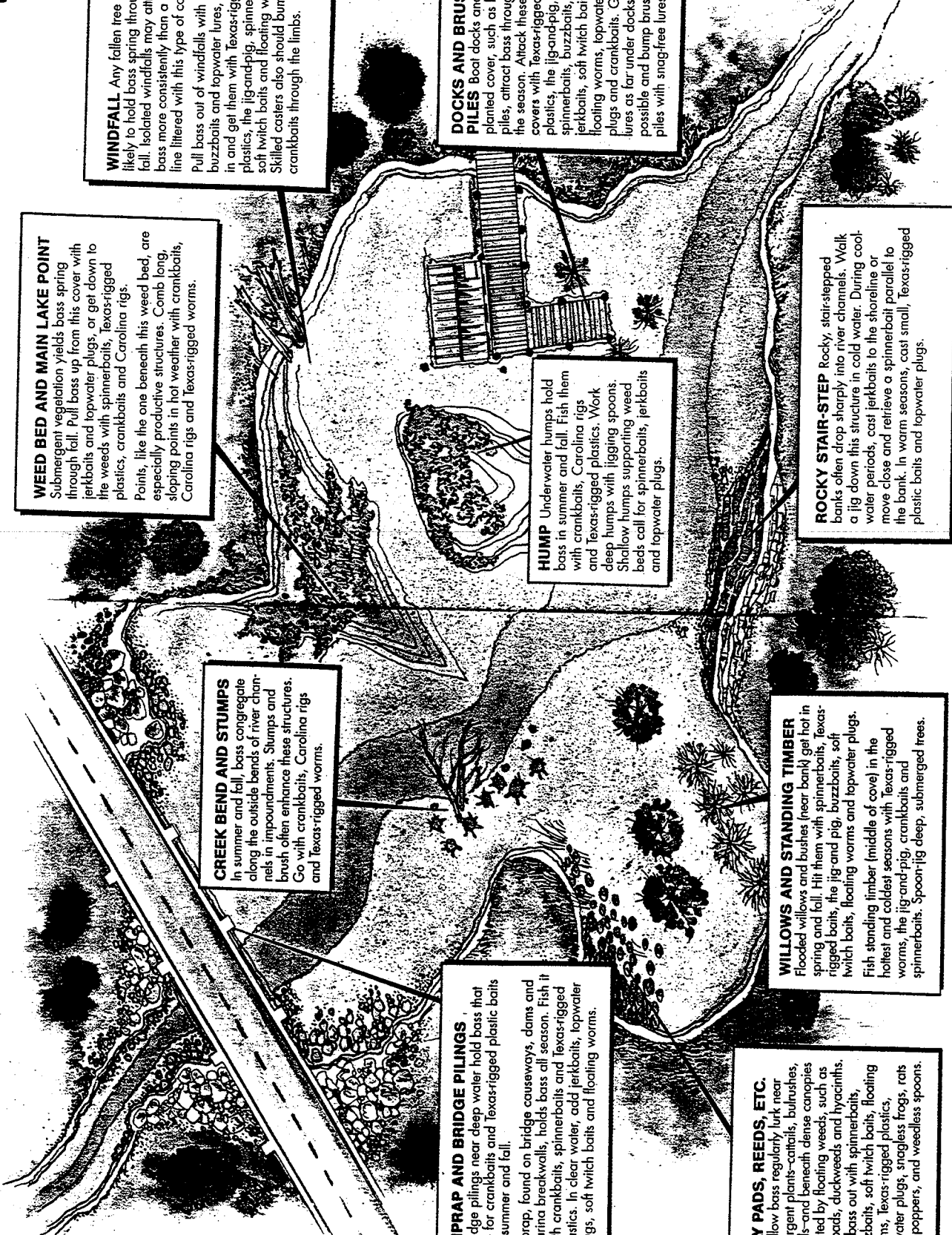

**WEED BED AND MAIN LAKE POINT**  
Submergent vegetation yields bass spring through fall. Pull bass up from this cover with jerkbaits and topwater plugs, or get down to the weeds with spinnerbaits, Texas-rigged plastics, crankbaits and Carolina rigs. Points, like the one beneath this weed bed, are especially productive structures. Comb long, sloping points in hot weather with crankbaits, Carolina rigs and Texas-rigged worms.

**CREEK BEND AND STUMPS**  
In summer and fall, bass congregate along the outside bends of river channels in impoundments. Slumps and brush often enhance these structures. Go with crankbaits, Carolina rigs and Texas-rigged worms.

**RIPRAP AND BRIDGE PILLINGS**  
Briarap near deep water hold bass that go for crankbaits and Texas-rigged plastic baits in summer and fall. Riprap, found on bridge causeways, dams and marina breakwalls, holds bass all season. Fish it with crankbaits, spinnerbaits and Texas-rigged plastics. In clear water, add jerkbaits, topwater plugs, soft twitch baits and floating worms.

**WINDFALL** Any fallen tree is likely to hold bass spring through fall. Isolated windfalls may attract bass more consistently than a shoreline littered with this type of cover. Pull bass out of windfalls with buzzbaits and topwater lures, or go in and get them with Texas-rigged plastics, the jig-and-pig, spinnerbaits, soft twitch baits and floating worms. Skilled casters also should bump crankbaits through the limbs.

**DOCKS AND BRUSH PILES** Boat docks and planned cover, such as brush piles, attract bass throughout the season. Attack these covers with Texas-rigged plastics, the jig-and-pig, spinnerbaits, buzzbaits, jerkbaits, soft twitch baits, floating worms, topwater plugs and crankbaits. Get lures as far under docks as possible and bump brush piles with snag-free lures.

**HUMP** Underwater humps hold bass in summer and fall. Fish them with crankbaits, Carolina rigs and Texas-rigged plastics. Work deep humps with jigging spoons. Shallow humps supporting weed beds call for spinnerbaits, jerkbaits and topwater plugs.

**WILLOWS AND STANDING TIMBER**  
Flooded willows and bushes (near bank) get hot in spring and fall. Hit them with spinnerbaits, Texas-rigged baits, the jig-and-pig, buzzbaits, soft twitch baits, floating worms and topwater plugs. Fish standing timber (middle of cove) in the hottest and coldest seasons with Texas-rigged worms, the jig-and-pig, crankbaits and spinnerbaits. Spoon-jig deep, submerged trees.

**ROCKY STAIR-STEP** Rocky, stair-stepped banks often drop sharply into river channels. Walk a jig down this structure in cold water. During cooler periods, cast jerkbaits to the shoreline or move close and retrieve a spinnerbait parallel to the bank. In warm seasons, cast small, Texas-rigged plastic baits and topwater plugs.

**LILY PADS, REEDS, ETC.**  
Shallow bass regularly lurk near emergent plants—cattails, bulrushes, reeds—and beneath dense canopies created by floating weeds, such as lily pads, duckweeds and hydracanth. Dig bass out with spinnerbaits, buzzbaits, soft twitch baits, floating worms, Texas-rigged plastics, topwater plugs, snagless frogs, rats and poppers, and weedless spoons.

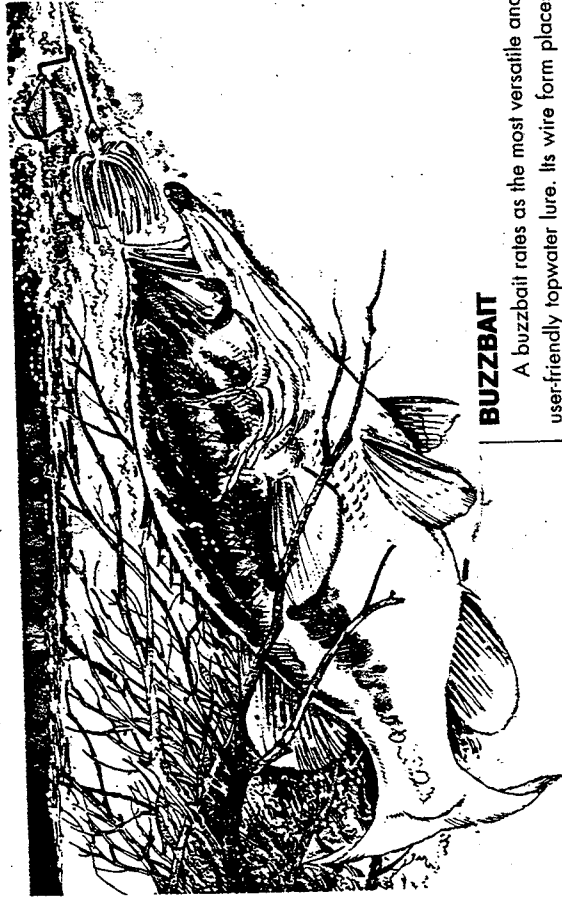

# Bass on the Surface

**CAUTION: The Sturgeon General has determined that topwater fishing can be hazardous to your emotional stability.**



The sight of a bass blitzing a surface lure invokes heart palpitations, trembling hands and leaves you craving the next hit. Those who succumb to this habit are among the most fanatical bass anglers.

Topwater fishing peaks when bass grow active during warm seasons and in clear water where the fish can see surface lures from greater distances. But don't write off cool or murky water altogether, since bass often wallop surface offerings under less than ideal conditions.

## BUZZBAIT

A buzzbait rates as the most versatile and user-friendly topwater lure. Its wire form places a spluttering blade or blades above and in front of a metal head dressed with a pulsating skirt. The hook's upright posture lets you retrieve a buzzbait over weeds, branches and other cover without snagging.

Use a buzzbait to boldly attack dense lairs that shield bass from treble-hooked topwater lures. Also buzz it over submerged cover and structure in open water. A slow retrieve that barely keeps the blade chattering often begets the greatest response, but sometimes it takes an upbeat pace to rile bass.

Noisy poppers call bass out of cover and up from deep water.

## POPPER

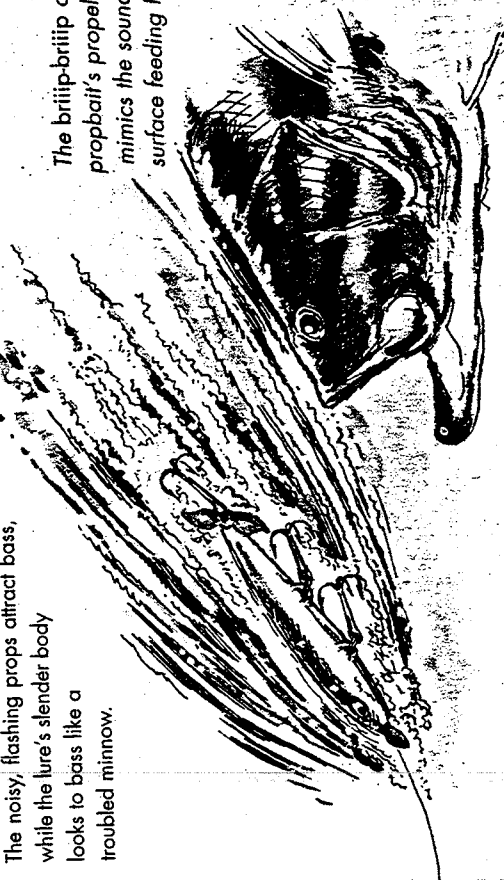
Jerk a surface popper ahead and its cupped face kicks up a commotion that draws bass out of cover and up from deep water. Depending on the popper's size, design and how hard you work it, the lure spits, pops or plunks. Proven retrieves include single, hard pops followed by long pauses, three to five quick pops interspaced by a brief pause and continuous, non-stop chugging. The most widely used poppers feature slender, cone-shaped  $\frac{3}{16}$ - to  $\frac{3}{8}$ -ounce bodies. Many have rear treble hooks dressed with hair or synthetic fibers to help tempt strikes.

## PROPBAIT

A propbait consists of a cigar-shaped body sporting metal propellers fore and aft. The noisy, flashing props attract bass, while the lure's slender body looks to bass like a troubled minnow.

The britt-britt of a propbait being ripped across the surface mimics the sound of surface-feeding fish and stirs a bass's competitive nature. Also retrieve propbaits with gentle twitch-pause movements that emulate an injured shad slapping the surface. Faint gestures and slightly flickering propellers may prove to be more than any self-respecting bass can resist.

The britt-britt of a propbait's propellers mimics the sound of surface feeding fish.

### STICKBAIT

The formidable stickbait, which resembles a fat stogie, has no noise-making embellishments. Its magic lies in its counterbalanced tail, which lifts the nose slightly out of the water. Twitch a stickbait on a semi-slack line and it swaps ends and glides to one side. Twitch it again and it cuts abruptly and darts in the opposite direction.

Mastering this sassy back-and-forth cadence, known as walking the dog, takes practice, but the effort results in a remarkably lifelike and tantalizing lure. The most popular stickbaits are heavy, typically 3/4-ounce. They cast well for distance and excel in clear, open water. Then again, a skilled angler can make a stickbait march left or right around stumps, logs and other cover and even purposely knock the lure on a bass's door.

*Master the sassy back-and-forth retrieve known as walking the dog and you can direct a stickbait to knock on a bass's door.*

*A subtle floating balsa minnow lets you play the ultimate cat-and-mouse game.*



### COMBATING WEED MATS

Bass bury under weed mats in summer to lounge in the cool, shaded water beneath. Ignite explosive strikes by dragging a hollow, soft-plastic frog, rat or popper over the vegetation. Large, upturned hooks curl over the backs of these lures, making them virtually snag-free.

When a bass blasts through the vegetation and engulfs the bait, the lure's body compresses, exposing the hooks. A slow, steady retrieve or a jerk-pause gambit should do the trick. Sometimes long pauses are necessary. When a bass strikes, hesitate a second before setting the hook.

Dragging a weedless spoon over weed mats also pulls bass to the surface. Dress the spoon with a skirt or a pork or plastic trailer to give it a larger profile and a livelier action.

### FLOATING MINNOW

When bass move into quiet, shallow water in spring, they often respond more favorably to subtle surface temptations. In this instance, a floating balsa minnow lets you play the ultimate cat-and-mouse game.

Cast a floating minnow tight to weed clumps, docks, brush and other visible cover. Let the ripples die and then work the lure with a tranquil twitch-and-wait retrieve. It teases bass into striking at a time when more aggressive agitation puts them off.

**NOTE:** Most topwater lures perform best with 15- to 20-pound test monofilament lines which tend to lie on the surface longer than thinner lines. The exception is when fishing a floating balsa minnow which calls for 8- to 10-pound test.

# The Sub-Surface Approach

## Fooling Bass where they live

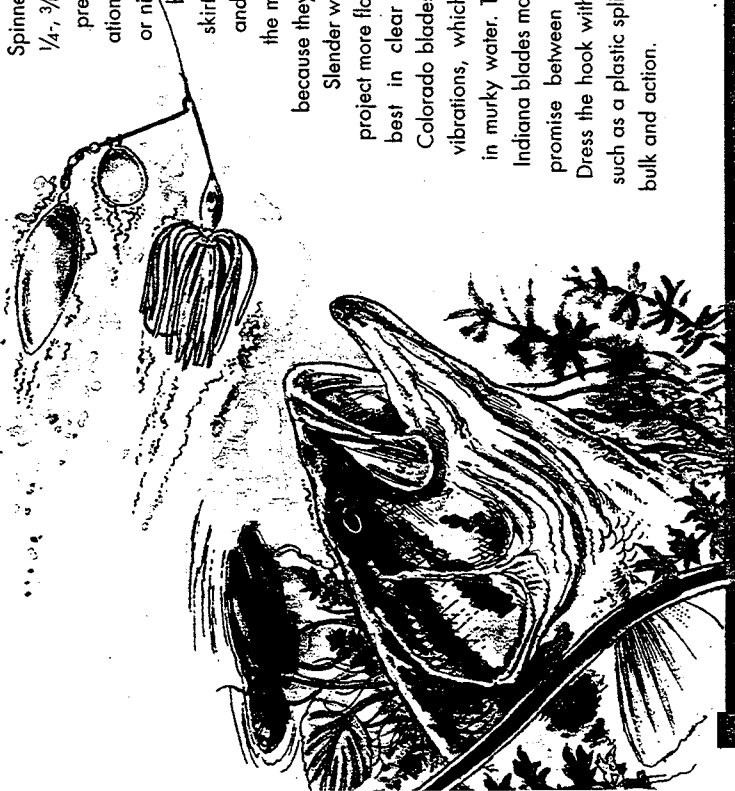
Though you can't beat topwater fishing for sheer exhilaration, bass spend most of their lives feeding and lounging beneath the surface. When they refuse to come up, the sub-surface approach puts an offering in their faces. From the following proven lures, select those that match the depth, cover and mood of the bass and you'll be richly rewarded.

### SPINNERBAITS

Regarded as the most versatile bass lures, spinnerbaits tempt strikes when burned just beneath the surface, run through weeds, brush and other cover, and retrieved slowly to depths of 15 feet or more, a play known as slow-rolling. The spinnerbait's overhead blade or blades shield the upturned hook, which lets you play hardball with bass cover.

Spinnerbaits weighing 1/4-, 3/8- and 1/2-ounce prevail in most situations. Flashing gold or nickel blades and brightly colored skirts, such as white and chartreuse, are the most widely used because they mimic baitfish.

Slender willow-leaf blades project more flash and produce best in clear water. Round Colorado blades kick out heavy vibrations, which summon bass in murky water. Teardrop-shaped Indiana blades make a good compromise between the other two. Dress the hook with a lively trailer, such as a plastic split-tail eel, to add bulk and action.



### SOFT TWITCH BAITS

Twitch a soft jerkbait or floating worm along just beneath the surface to show bass an irresistibly lifelike, darting minnow action. Rig these baits Texas-style, or Tex-posed and fish them without fear of snagging.

Soft jerkbaits and floating worms work magic in clear water around shallow cover, such as weeds, windfalls and boat docks. Forego any type of weight in most cases. When you pause between twitches or pulls, these lures sink slowly, almost suspending in some instances. This is when bass make their move.



### JERKBAITS

A sub-surface, twitch-twitch-pause retrieve transforms floating and suspending long minnow lures into jerkbaits. The most popular models feature short bills and run 2 to 4 feet deep, but long-billed jerkbaits may be employed to get deeper.

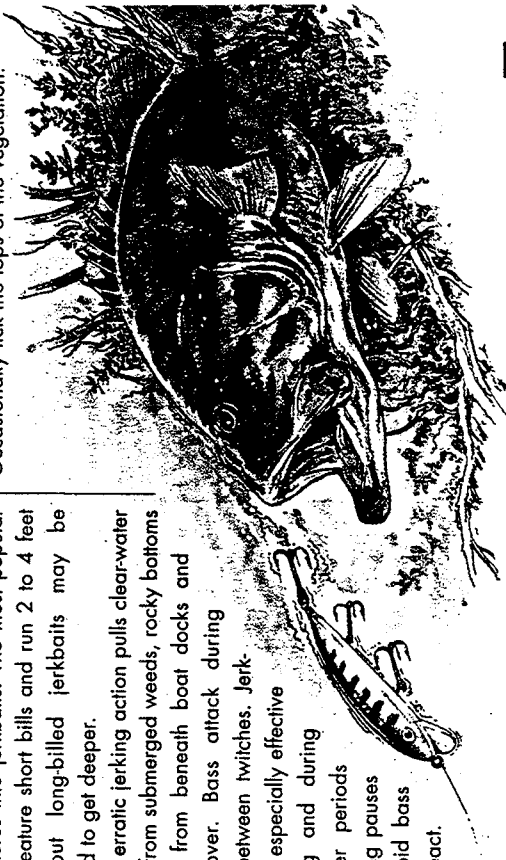
The erratic jerking action pulls clear-water bass up from submerged weeds, rocky bottoms and out from beneath boat docks and other cover. Bass attack during pauses between twitches. Jerkbaits are especially effective in spring and during cold-water periods when long pauses give torpid bass time to react.

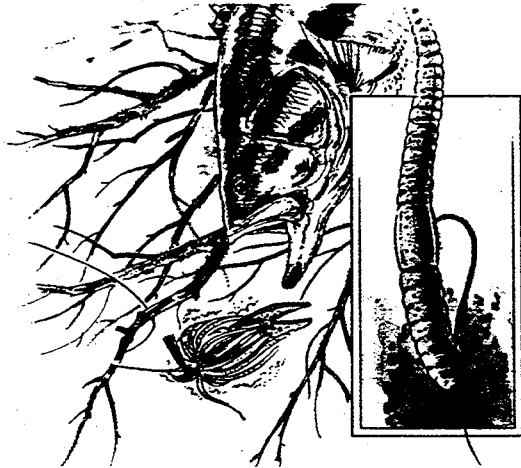
### CRANKBAITS

Diving, wiggling crankbaits emulate bait-fish and crayfish, come in models that run from less than 1 to more than 20 feet deep, and catch bass in clear to muddy water. They trigger most strikes when plowed into stumps, rocks and other bass cover. Many strikes occur when you pause after bumping an object or ripping the lure through weeds.

Floating crankbaits back up during pauses, reducing snags. Suspending models hang in place when stopped and coax lethargic bass.

The sinking rattler has no bill and vibrates madly when retrieved briskly. BBs chatter inside the lure, calling out to bass. Run rattlers in open water above cover, especially submergent weeds. Occasionally tick the tops of the vegetation.





### CAROLINA RIG

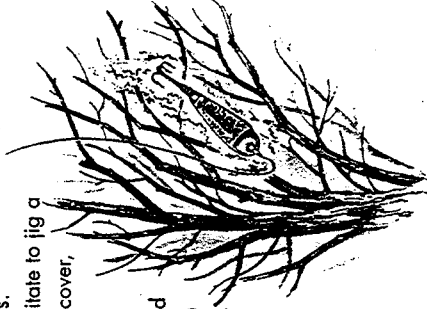
When bass relate to expansive underwater weed beds or large bottom structures, such as points, flats and humps, the Carolina rig lets you comb these areas fast and effectively. The rig's heavy sinker, typically 3/4- or 1-ounce, casts far, sinks fast and kicks up a commotion on the bottom. When bass come around to investigate, they are duped by a soft-plastic offering dancing behind the sinker on a leader. Lizards and French fry style worms perform especially well.



### JIGGING SPOON

A jiggling spoon affords the most efficient means for presenting a lure to bass when they retreat to the depths in cold water and also during the hottest weather. Drop a 3/4- to 1-ounce jiggling spoon straight down to the bottom and it sinks fast with a tight flutter. Then repeatedly snap it up and let it fall back. Go with short hops in cold water and high lifts when it's hot. Strikes occur as the spoon drops.

Don't hesitate to jig a spoon in wood cover, such as stumps and the tops of standing, flooded trees. The spoon snags frequently, but quickly jiggles loose. Its compact weight serves to knock the hook loose.



### JIGS AND WORMS

Snag-resistant jig-and-pig combinations and Texas-rigged plastic worms let you fish any bass cover with impunity. A 6- to 7 1/2-inch straight or ribbon-tail worm takes bass about anywhere. In ultra-clear water, opt for a 4-inch finesse worm. Match a worm with the lightest bullet sinker that maintains reliable bottom contact. Sinkers from 1/16- to 1/2-ounce let you adjust to a wide variety of depths and covers. Dark colors (junebug, black) produce best in murky water, while light colors (plum, pumpkinseed) draw more strikes in clear water.

A 1/4- to 1/2-ounce weedless jig dressed with a pork frog mimics a crayfish and ranks as the all-time best trophy bass bait. You can't go wrong with black, brown and other dark crayfish colors. Penetrate dense, brushy cover with a jig-and-pig and prance the offering under a bass's nose. Irresistible. This lure also excels when hopped over rocky bottoms, especially in cold water.

# All about Terminal Tackle

Get the most out of bass lures by rigging them right, matching them to the proper lines and making good connections. Use the following tips to insure optimum lure performance and prevent heavyweight bass from breaking off after you hook them. Something as basic as tying a good knot is just as important as locating bass and choosing the right lure.

### MONOFILAMENT VS. SUPER LINES

For most bass fishing applications, monofilament lines should be your first choice. [See "Matching Lines To Lures" below:] "Super" lines made from Spectra and similar fibers are thinner, tougher and more sensitive than mono, but their lack of stretch often causes problems.

Instances where super lines provide benefits include: fishing jigs and soft-plastic baits in extremely heavy cover (strength); spoon jigging deep water (sensitivity); as the main line ahead of a mono leader when fishing a Carolina rig (sensitivity).

### MATCHING LINES TO LURES

**20-25 POUND TEST:** Jiggling spoons; weed rats; weedless spoons; jig-and-pig and Texas-rigged baits fished in dense, abrasive cover.  
**15-20 POUND TEST:** Spinnerbaits; buzzbaits; topwater plugs; jig-and-pig and Texas-rigged baits fished through typical cover in clear to stained water.



**10-12 POUND TEST:** Crankbaits; floating minnows; jerkbaits; soft twitch baits; floating worms; Texas-rigged baits over sparse cover in clear water.

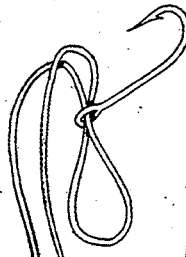
**6-8 POUND TEST:** Small, finesse, Texas-rigged baits in ultra-clear water.

### THREE ESSENTIAL KNOTS

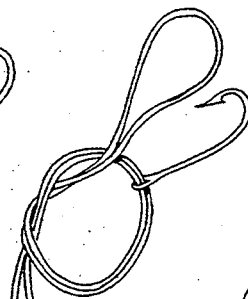
#### PALOMAR KNOT

The simplest and one of the strongest knots, the Palomar securely joins lines to lures, hooks and swivels.

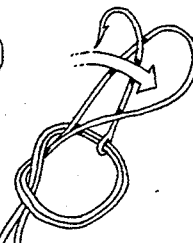
**Step 1.** Double the end of the line and push the loop through the line eye.



**Step 2.** Make a simple overhand knot above the hook or lure.



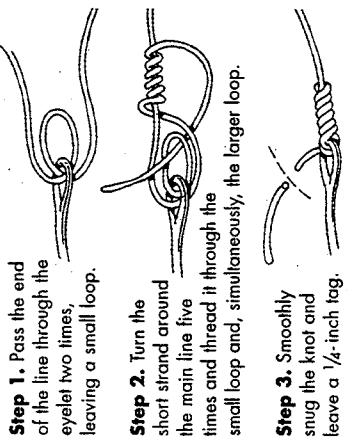
**Step 3.** Pass the hook or lure through the loop. Pull the line snug over the top of the eyelet and leave a 1/4-inch tag end after trimming.





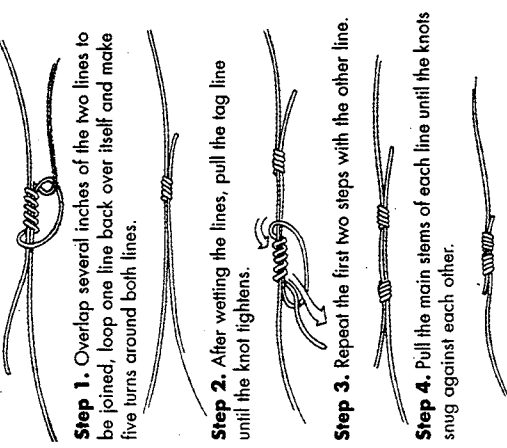
**TRILENE KNOT**

As with the Palomar, the Trilene knot puts two wraps of line around the eyelet, which vastly improves strength under fishing conditions. It is easier to tie than the Palomar when dealing with large, treble-hooked lures.



**DOUBLE UNI KNOT**

The Double UNI can't be beat for joining one line to another, particularly when tying monofilament line to a slippery Super Line.



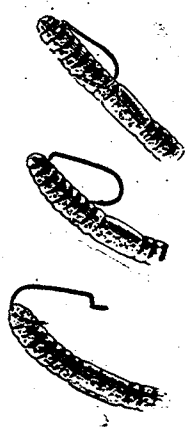
**SNAPS & SWIVELS**

In most instances, tie lines directly to hooks, line eyes or to the split rings that usually come attached to crankbaits. Snaps and swivels show bass unnecessary hardware, may imbalance lures and tend to catch weeds. Snaps also encourage overusing a knot. Whenever you switch lures, tie a fresh knot.

One exception is a crankbait that has no split ring. In this instance, a snap gives the lure more freedom to wiggle.

**TEXAS-RIG**

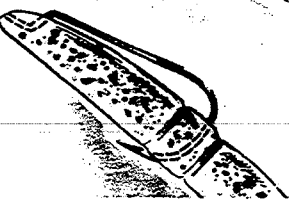
The celebrated Texas-rig transforms worms, craws, lizards, twitch baits and other soft-plastic offerings into virtually snagfree lures.



**Step 1.** Tie the line to a No. 1/0 to 4/0 plastic worm hook, such as the reliable offset design. Match larger hooks with thicker worms and vice versa. Push the point of the hook into the end of the bait about 1/4-inch and run it out the belly.

**Step 2.** Pull the hook down through the worm until the line eye slips just inside the plastic and twist the hook to face the lure.

**Step 3.** Lift the body of the bait slightly toward the hook's eye and push the point into the plastic. When done right, the lure hangs straight.



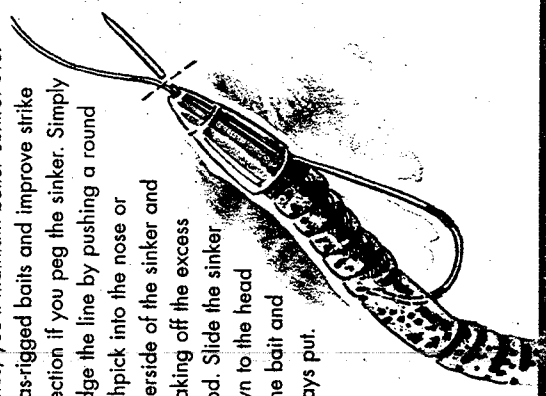
**TEX-POSED**

If you're having trouble hooking bass with a standard Texas rig, try the Tex-posed version. Follow steps 1 and 2 for the Texas-rig. Then, instead of pushing the hook into the plastic, run it straight up through the lure so the point lies parallel to the back of the bait.

Next, insert the very tip of the hook's point just under the "skin" of the plastic bait where it easily pops free when you set the hook. (Note: With many soft-plastic twitch baits, you're better off leaving a Tex-posed hook exposed.)

**PEGGING BULLET SINKERS**

In heavy cover, such as brush and flooded bushes, you'll maintain better control over Texas-rigged baits and improve strike detection if you peg the sinker. Simply wedge the line by pushing a round toothpick into the nose or underside of the sinker and breaking off the excess wood. Slide the sinker down to the head of the bait and it stays put.



**CAROLINA RIG**

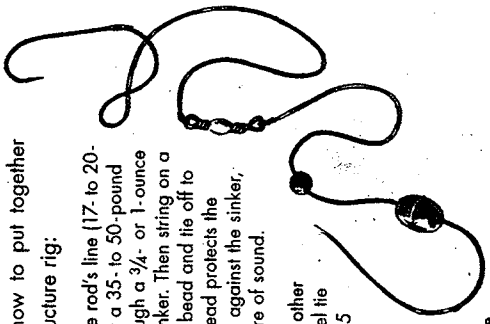
Here's how to put together this stellar structure rig:

**Step 1.** Run the rod's line (17- to 20-pound mono or a 35- to 50-pound super line) through a 3/4- or 1-ounce egg or bullet sinker. Then string on a glass or plastic bead and tie off to a swivel. The bead protects the knot and jostles against the sinker, adding the allure of sound.

**Step 2.** To the other end of the swivel tie a leader about 5 pounds lighter than the rod's line. Leader length ranges from 18 inches to 5 feet or more.

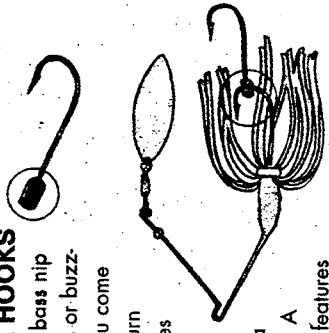
Short leaders fare best when fishing hard bottoms with little cover. Long leaders excel in submerged grass beds.

**Step 3.** Tie a worm hook to the end of the leader and Texas-rig a lizard or some other soft plastic bait.



**TRAILER HOOKS**

When bass nip spinnerbaits or buzz-baits but you come up empty, turn missed strikes into solid hookups by adding a trailer hook. A trailer hook features an oversize eye that slips over the large barbs found on spinnerbaits and buzzbaits. Before attaching a trailer hook, encase its eye with a short piece of rubber surgical tubing. The tubing grips the bend of the lure's hook and holds the trailer firmly in place.





## Hoosier Classic

IBAD had their final Hoosier Classic on Lake Monroe in Bloomington, Indiana.

I thought you'd like to know what Wayne knows about catching bass is ZERO. He and his partner, Ken Baughman, were fishing for awhile on Friday. Ken caught a 4-lb bass. I think Wayne caught several on Friday, but then on Saturday, during the tournament....ZERO.

Friday and Saturday were beautiful -- warm and breezy -- unusual for the last day of October. On Sunday, a cold front came through and it was windy and rainy. We were LUCKY we were finished. The IBAD First Place winner was Bob Shipley, who only caught one bass - about 2 pounds (with Flipping' jig & pork). Second Place was Alan Rork, who caught one bass at 1 1/2 pounds (with Carolina rig and worm). There were 10 boats and 20 anglers and only 2 bass caught. Huh! Huh!

## Batteries: Tips

Batteries are the most important, and the most critical part of your fishing arsenal. Batteries supply electricity for your trolling motor, dash gauges, live wells, Depthfinder, navigation lights, and the most important, it cranks your outboard motor. An unhealthy battery can play the devils out of you on your next fishing trip or worse, your next NBAD tournament. Here are some tips and some dangers you need to watch out for. This is a reminder that a battery can explode in your face, so beware of the danger. When doing repair, please disconnect the wiring from the positive and negative posts or better yet, take the battery out and sit it in a safe place outside of your garage. Just be sure you are in an open area. You must have plenty of ventilation.

Clean your battery very well. It should look clean and shiny. You can use baking soda and water to get all grime, dirt, greenish electrode stuff off the face of the battery. Please note that a dirty battery can create an electric path from your positive pole to your negative pole and it will drain down your battery. While cleaning, watch your rags or paper towels and dispose of them in a proper container. Do not let any acid get on your clothes or you will end up with holes in your blue jeans.

Read your manuals on proper

care of your batteries. You will need to know how much water to add or what is the proper fill line. You must use clean water, or better yet, distilled water. Never, never overfill a battery. You can cause some damage. Get a good battery charger. Dual Pro Charger is your best investment. A good battery charger is the one that will shut off when your battery is properly charged or at the correct density. You will need to buy a density meter. Learn how to use it. It can tell you if you have a dead cell.

Your terminal connections need to be checked and cleaned at least annually or before you make your annual trip to the NBAD tournament. If you have a wire brush or a rotor wire brush for your electric drill, the better. Use it to clean your battery posts and your connections. Dirt, grime, electric corrosion, and grease can make poor connection and if not cleaned, can cause poor trolling motor performance. Loose or poor connection can cause excessive head and maybe overhead and burn off. All connections should be clean and very shiny. Be sure to tighten all connections. Carry some spare tools and extra-distilled water in your boat. Have a great day fishing.

The officer handed him the

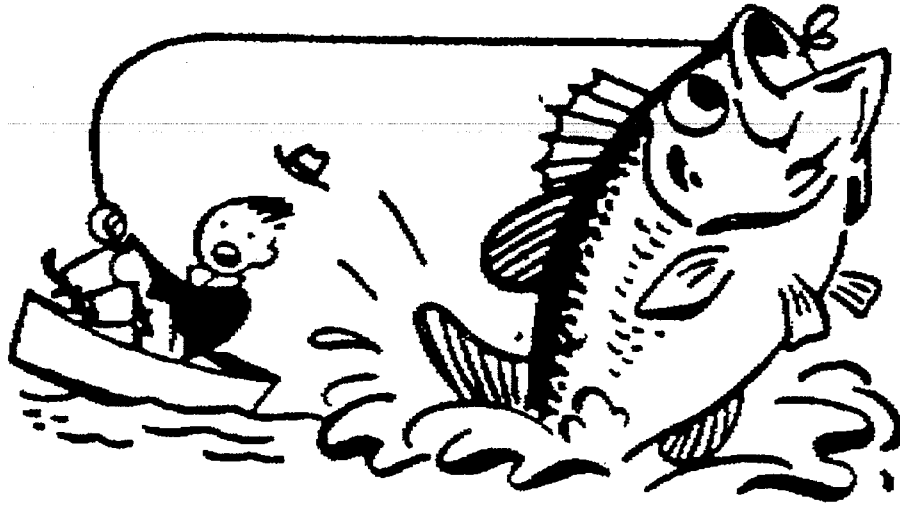
