Another broken record NBAD Team Tournament at Watts Bar Lake

National Bass Association of the Deaf is definitely growing with new and regular "Die-Hard" fishing people. Why people? Because we have diversity of cultural and general NBAD fans, participants, supporters and sponsors that have been making NBAD successful.

The record breaker of the last NBAD tournament recorded two hundred twelve (212) NBAD participants. Tennessee Bass Association of the Deaf and HI-BASS was the host to the NBAD. The co-hosts did a fantastic job promoting the NBAD. Special hats off to the co-hosts!

Impossible Be Possible" Medford Magill

This incident happened during the 1998 National Bass Association of the Deaf (NBAD) Annual Team Tournament at Watts Bar Lake in Tennessee.

Miles South, North, East and West from NBAD Headquarters on the beautiful and spreading Watts Bar Lake early Tuesday morning 106 teams, composed of two fishermen a team zoomed in their high powered bass boats to their "honey holes," with a hope that the large lunkers were there waiting to grab some morsel offered by the fishermen.

Tuesday the first day of the tournament in the afternoon, nearing time for the teams to return to headquarters, the wind started blowing harder, causing the waters out in the wide openings to be very rough, causing foaming wakes. Most of the fishing was done in coves and small canals to escape from the rough water and wind.

Mack Wilson, NBAD Secretary and his partner Medford Magill had to return to the headquarters a little early because of other official duties they had to do at the weight-in time. When we skimmed into rough open water, the lake was rough up as if it is somewhere in the Gulf of Mexico. With its high speed bassboat skimming and flopping over the top of the waves, keeping their caps on was impossible so they took them off and sit on them.

After a rough ride, worst than a wild bronco ride, we arrived at the headquarters safe minus Medford's cap. Upon nearing the dock, Medford with Mack's help, could not find his cap anywhere in and around the boat. Then Medford told Mack that he assumed it flew out more than one of the big flop waves



somewhere miles out in the lake and to forget the cap. Of course, Medford was disappointed to lose the cap that he had the ninety-eight hosts, Missouri and Tennessee embroider on it. He said that he had more than 100 caps anyway. That Tuesday, we brought in only three eligibilities weigh in bass with Mack 2 and Medford 1.

Wednesday morning of the tournament, the same 106 boats zoomed out all over the lake. We decided to try another "honey hole" destination farther South that day.

After fishing several coves and canals with little luck, we assumed that we ran into places where the bass were still in the kindergarten class. (Not eligible to keep, less than required 12" in length). So, on another move through a passage that was a short cut into another part of the lake, Mack elbowed me at the controls and pointed to a cap floating on a small bush pile, Hey! Mack, pointing to the cap, said, this is your cap, Medford! I laughed because I knew that was impossible! My cap was one of the 200 plus caps that the host had given out.

I was aware of the possibility of getting the host caps mixed up with anglers, so I scribed my name on the back of the manufacturer's label in the cap.

Still laughing, I managed to get my boat close enough to the spot

where the cap was floating for Mack to grab it. The cap Mack grabbed was sure one of the hosts' caps. I told Mack, if this cap has my name on it, then it is mine. Mack picked the cap from the lake and peeled off the label slowly and said "M A G I L L.".

Unbelievable, I yelled back at Mack and said stop kidding! Mack then handed me the cap and I read my name on the cap saying "M A G I L L". This got my eyes wide open Sure enough, it was one of my caps floating on the lake so huge you will never know where it was when it flew off your boat.

Thank Goodness. This cap will be another one of my collections since the beginning of the NBAD back in 1975. Super natural occurrence and an unbelievable thing happened so we should learn from it and accept the fact that nothing is impossible.



John DuQuin captures Western Deaf Bass Championship for the 3rd Time at Lake Berryessa!

It was a heavy pouring hitting at Lake Berryessa Thursday, April 23, 1998 and filled the lake to its full capacity. It was beautiful day both Friday and Sunday. Nevertheless, Saturday was very windy and caused the water very choppy. Just a month ago, heavy rainstorms flooded 2-3 feet deep in some campground areas that were very muddy forcing vacationing deaf anglers and their families finding somewhere else to stay overnight. The storm also hit just a few days before Northern California Angling and Camping Club of the Deaf held its 13th Annual Western Deaf Bass Championship event on April 25-26 weekend. It was the only annual deaf bass fishing tournament in Western states. Lake Berryessa is in Napa County, Northern California that is renowned for its famous wine manufacturing.

Bass fishing sizzled with many new club records and some good 6 TackleBox News Spring 1999

numbers of deaf anglers reported that they boated 15-40 fish per day including several largemouth bass weighing up to almost 10 lbs. The hottest lures were plastics and jigs. This deaf bass tournament set twelve new records for the most fish catch/weight! The impressive record of most fish catch in two days was whopping 140 bass (previous record was 101 from last year).

The biggest bass of the tournament was 7.15 lbs. It also sets a record! We were catching more largemouth bass than smallmouth bass this year.

A 3-time bass champion in 1989, 1993 and 1998, John DuQuin of Rancho Cucamonga, CA was the first deaf bass pro to receive top honors at the Western Deaf Bass Derby at Lake Berryessa 3 times! He decked ten bass totaling 15.9 lbs. including his 4.5 and 3.6 lbs. bass to lead him into winning this championship! His secret was using 6 inch smoke or clear plastic worms and green lizards in 5-10 depth of the lake near some brush and rocky ledges.

John DuQuin received a pleasant trophy plaque with an attractive handmade sculpture of jumping bass plus \$450.00.

The 2nd place winner went to Robert Odom of Oakland, CA with \$300.00.

Last year's champion Dave Ford of San Ramon, CA finished 3rd with \$250.00.

Milton Peters of Fremont, CA

won 4th place with \$200.00 Keith Brown of Downey, CA hit 5th place for \$150.00. Edward Smith of Bera, CA for

7th place at \$90.00

The lunker Saturday was by John DuQuin at 4.5 lbs. with \$75.00. The Sunday Lunker prize went to Richard Tennies for \$50.00 and the biggest lunker of the tournament. He set a new record of 7.15 lbs.

You have my best wishes for the best Bass Anglers Fishing Tournament.



President Wayne Mnich moved that NBAD will inspect the lake that the Host wins within 60-90 days. (Passed)

- 7. Duties and responsibilities of NBAD Officers during the NBAD tournament, 1998...
 President Wayne Mnich recommended that NBAD Boards should go out to fishing first and return back first to weigh in and do the duties.
- 8. To join or not to join: Bass Federation...

 President Wayne Mnich recommended that NBAD not to join Bass Federation.
- NBAD Bassmaster's Classic?
 President Wayne Mnich said NBAD doesn't have much enough money for the Classic.
- 10. Incorporation: future tournament sites (host)...

 President Wayne Mnich moved that NBAD pay the expenses to the Host of tournament for adding incorporated. The motion was amended to bring to Council of Representatives. (Passed)

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

- Vice President Carlos Holdridge reported that for 1997 AOAs, he collected 513 affiliated members and 23 clubs.
- Six AOAs mailed to Bobby Seremeth was lost in mail. Bobby said he never received them. Filed a mail/lost report with the PO and waited for 24 days and the PO said no such mail was found.
- Started a process of asking the six clubs to reissue a check to replace the one that was lost. So far only three did send a replacement check. Still waiting on Baton Rouge Deaf Bass Anglers and Kentucky Deaf Bass Anglers. Of the six AOAs, one was cash and the rest were checks.
- NBAD Post Tournament Newsletters was definite late due to the fact that Carlo was waiting on the 1997 tournament results to be printed. We waited so long to get them and never gotten them so with President Wayne Mnich, Treasurer Alan Rork, Secretary Mack Wilson, we combined the Newsletter and the flyers into one mail out late in December 1997 or early January 1998. There was some money saving if Mack had sent out his own flyers, he would have to pay 32 cents postal for a total of \$182.72 and Carlos would have to pay 55 cents for newsletters for a total of \$282.15. The Mack's and Carlos's totals would have been \$464.87. With both flyers and newsletters, the total alone was \$353.00, saving of \$111.87 was realized.

TREASURER'S REPORT:







ARTICLE VII - TOURNAMENT RULES

The Tournament Rules shall apply to both the one day Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the three days NBAD Tournament. The Monday Lunker Tournament is a single fish tournament and only the largest bass shall be awarded as decided beforehand by the COR. NBAD Tournament is a team tournament where each team will be awarded as decided beforehand by the COR. The Tournament Rules shall be printed with the tournament-announced rivers and inside each souvenir book every year.

Section 1 - SPORTSMANSHIP: Any contestant who displays poor sportsmanship, violates any of the contest rules or violates the state fishing laws shall be promptly disqualify. Intoxication on the part of any contestant will not be tolerated and will result in disqualification. Any violation will result in a two (2) year suspension. IF a second offense, a lifetime suspension shall be imposed.

Section 2 - CLUB SHIRT: Every member who participates the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD

Tournament is encouraged to wear club's name on his shirt.

Section 3 - FISH: Black bass (largemouth, smallmouth, and spotted bass) may be scored only.

Section 4 - PARTICIPANTS AND ELIGIBILITY: Participant in the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament is open to any deaf or hard of hearing and no discrimination by sex or race. Changing of boat

partner shall not be allowed unless by act of God. Participant shall be 18 years of age or older.

Section 5 - PARTNER IN TEAM TOURNAMENT: The Host Club and NBAD are not responsibility for the pairing the partners. All contestants will arrange boat partners under mutual agreement. A team of two contestants will fish together throughout the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament or the NBAD Tournament. See special handicapped rule Section 6. No rotation of boat partners will take place for any given reason once their names are registered with NBAD. In case of emergency, illness or serious injury should any one members of the team be forced to leave the NBAD Tournament, the other will either be automatically dropped out or be accompanied by an appointed observer (see Rule # 15 or replacing fisherman rule #21), to preserve order and harmony in all NBAD Tournament where arrangement of boat partner is concerned. Tournament officials reserve the right to make necessary changes unless otherwise agreed. Each two-man team shall equally share selection of water routes and fishing spots. Fair shares in expenses involving and use of the boat is required of every boat partner. Non boaters (partner) shall not be liable for expense incurred by the breakdowns on the equipment including a boat, itself during the NBAD Tournament. The boat owner should prepare and be responsibility on his or her boat. Boat owners/partners shall not, during weightin use another members' boat stalls. Boat owner/partner shall be disqualify.

Section 6 - SPECIAL HANDICAPPED PARTICIPATION: Two teams can fish out of a platoon boat. Each team must have one healthy person and one handicapped person. Rule # Section 5 shall apply as if it is one team and both teams must be mutual when sharing the responsible of a platoon. There shall be one Host committee observer for each

two-team boat.

Section 7 - TACKLE AND EQUIPMENT: Artificial lures shall be used during the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. Only casting, spincasting, or spinning rods and reels will be allowed. Only one line may be in the water at any time. Additional rigged rods will be permitted in the boat as substitutes. Use of 7 1/2 foot flip rod is permitted. Motor trolling with gas-powered outboard engines is prohibited. Depthfinder, thermometers, etc., which are not in violation of state laws may be used.

Section 8 - FISHING WATERS: All water in the lake where the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament are held may be fished. No fishing will be permitted within 50 yards of another contestant whose boat tied down or anchored, and within 50 yards of the headquarters. Bank fishing is prohibited. Contestant(s) may

rent boats.

Section 9 - LAUNCHING TIME: Issuance of check-in cards will be conducted at the boat dock area at a designated time. No time limit or checkout and may check out at your discretion. Tournament officials must inspect your boat before you leave at first checkout. Tournament participants must arrive with check-in card and fish for the weight-in before designated time, if late, will be disqualified for that one particular day. Contestant may return to dock for lunch or rest but can not report for weight-in until at a designated for each day. Dues to unexpected weather condition, NBAD Executive Members may alternate the launch and weight-in time. Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament shall be on a Monday before Father day and the time shall be from 6:00 A.M. until 11:00 A.M. The NBAD Tournament shall be on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, before Father Day in June. The time of the NBAD Tournament shall begin at 6:00 A.M. and conclude at 3:00 P.M. each day unless state regulations are different from NBAD.

ARTICLE VII - TOURNAMENT RULES (continued)

Section 10 - SCORING: Scoring will be based on the weigh-in pounds and ounces or pounds with two placed decimals. The minimum length shall be 12 inches with mouth closed or the legal minimum length of the NBAD Tournament Lake. The maximum number of bass shall be 10 bass per person per day or the legal limit of the NBAD Tournament Lake. [The new five basses per person will go in effect during the year of 2000.] NBAD will deduct two ounces (2 oz) for each dead bass brought m for weight-in by each participant.

Section 11 - TIES: In the even of a tie where the weigh, length, and girth of a fish are equal, all prizes shall be divided equally and additional trophies, if necessary, shall be awarded.

Section 12 - LIFE JACKETS: Contestant must wear life jackets while gasoline powered boats are in use.

Section 13 - REGISTRATION: The date, time, and place or registration will be sent out well in advance to persons who are interested in entering the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. All contestants must register at headquarters. Those who arrive late are still welcome they must register before entering the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. Meeting time shall be announced at the headquarters. Tournament hours shall be announced at the General Meeting.

Section 14 - RULES CHANGES: Interpretation of the NBAD Tournament Rules shall be the responsibility of the NBAD Vice President with approval of the NBAD Executive Board. The NBAD Officers shall make final decision in all matter with the approval of the Executive Board.

Section 15 - MONDAY LUNKER TOURNAMENT: There shall be two participants per boat with no exception and each participant must be registered to fish in the NBAD Tournament. See rule Section 6 for special handicapped. Section 16 - SINGLE ENTREE NUMBER ENTRIES: If a participant is the last contest a single entree and fishes alone, he or she will earn 1 1/2 times his or her catches. The single fisherman in the NBAD Tournament must be the General Chairman or NBAD officers (see rule Section 5 for boat partner).

Section 17 - SAFETY: To ensure the safety of all contestants, no contestant shall be allowed to compete alone in a boat at any Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament or NBAD Tournament. In case of a contestant who, after pairing all of the boat partner in the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament, finds him or her without a registered contestant as a boat partner shall immediately be assigned one of several appointed observers by the tournament officials. The observer, as boat partner, shall know the NBAD Tournament Rules, be permitted to operate the boats and assist the contestant in any way (see rule #14).

Section 18 - FISHING GUIDE: There shall be no fishing with a guide for hire within fourteen (14) days prior the first day of the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament. Upon evidence of fishing with a guide, the contestant will be disqualified for the entire NBAD Tournament.

Section 19 - NO FISHING PRACTICE: There shall be no fishing during the General Meeting.

Section 20 - KILL SWITCH: To ensures the safety of all contestants. the boat operating with electrical ignition shall be required to have a kill switch in the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament and it must be engaged while boat is moving.

Section 21 - BOAT NUMBERS: Participating boats must have numbered stickers, issued by the NBAD officials at the registering. Numbered stickers must be placed on each side of the outboard in a clean view. Numbers from 1 to 10 are reserved for the NBAD officers and host committee officials to be recognized. It is important to keep your number on or face some difficulties on securing another numeral.

Section 22 - REASON FOR LEAVING: That before the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament a replacing fisherman must pay his/her full tournament fee before the NBAD Tournament.

Section 23 - C. B. Radio: Participant in the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament shall not use a C. B. radio and shall disqualify and be rejected from that tournament.

Section 24 - DISQUALIFIED: A contestant who is disqualified for any of the three days can weight his fish in case his reason of disqualification(s) is appealed.

Section 25 - BOAT REQUIREMENT: Every boat in the Monday NBAD Lunker Tournament and the NBAD Tournament must have the following items: kill switch, safety cushions, life jackets, first aid, fire extinguisher, state fishing license, and horn and/or whistle.


5th Annual Invitational Tournament - Lake Anna, VA hosted by MarVa Silent Bass Anglers



JIGGING SPOON



SNAPS & SWIVELS

In most instances, tie lines directly to hooks, line eyes or to the split rings that usually come attached to crankbaits. Snaps and swivels show bass unnecessary hardware, may Snaps also encourage overusing a knot. imbalance lures and tend to catch weeds. Whenever you switch lures, tie a fresh knot.

One exception is a crankbait that has no split ring. In this instance, a snap gives the lure more freedom to wiggle.

TEXAS-RIG

The celebrated Texas-rig transforms worms, craws, lizards, twitch baits and other soft-plastic offerings into virtually snagfree lures.

PEGGING BULLET SINKERS

Slide the sinker down to the head of the bait and it stays put.

Hoosier Classic

IBAD had their final Hoosier Classic on Lake Monroe in Bloomington, Indiana.

Batteries: Tips

Batteries are the most important, and the most critical part of your fishing arsenal. Batteries supply electricity for your trolling motor, dash gauges, live wells, Depthfinder, navigation lights, and the most important, it cranks your outboard motor. An unhealthy battery can play the devils out of you on your next fishing trip or worse, your next NBAD tournament. Here are some tips and some dangers you need to watch out for. This is a reminder that a battery can explode in your face, so beware of the danger. When doing repair, please disconnect the wiring from the positive and negative posts or better yet, take the battery out and sit it in a safe place outside of your garage. Just be sure you are in an open area. You must have plenty of ventilation.

Clean your battery very well. It should look clean and shiny. You can use baking soda and water to get all grime, dirt, greenish electrode stuff off the face of the battery. Please note that a dirty battery can create an electric path from your positive pole to your negative pole and it will drain down your battery. While cleaning, watch your rags or paper towels and dispose of them in a proper container. Do not let any acid get on your clothes or you will end up with holes in your blue jeans.

Read your manuals on proper

care of your batteries. You will need to know how much water to add or what is the proper fill line. You must use clean water, or better vet, distilled water. Never. never overfill a battery. You can cause some damage. Get a good battery charger. Dual Pro Charger is your best investment. A good battery charger is the one that will shut off when your battery is properly charged or at the correct density. You will need to buy a density meter. Learn how to use it. It can tell you if you have a dead cell.

Your terminal connections need to be checked and cleaned at least annually or before you make your annual trip to the NBAD tournament. If you have a wire brush or a rotor wire brush for your electric drill, the better. Use it to clean your battery posts and your connections. Dirt. grime. electric corrosion, and grease can make poor connection and if not cleaned, can cause poor trolling motor performance. Loose or poor connection can cause excessive head and maybe overhead and burn off. connections should be clean and very shiny. Be sure to tighten all connections. Carry some spare tools and extra-distilled water in your boat. Have a great day fishing.

He says, "Ma'am, I'm blind, but | The officer handed him the


